

HAPPY SPRING

NOTES FROM THE BOARD

The air is warm and the breezes around Windcrest East are blowing through the trees. Plantings are being done and the roads have been cleaned of sand from the eleven snow storms Windcrest East suffered through the winter. The flag has to be replaced that is now tattered and torn from the effects of this winter but it now feels that spring is at last upon us.

The landscaper has started to prepare the beds for the season and mulch will be provided to all the beds in the community. Everyone should have received notification from the property manager indicating if the homeowner wishes to tend to their own plantings in the limited common area during the year. All plantings in the common areas will be taken care of by the landscaper.

This year there are a couple of changes in the committee structure of the HOA. There is an irrigation committee separate from the landscape committee; this was done to have a select group of individuals be responsible for this important task. They have been provided with a report from the sprinkler company of required repairs and changes to be made to the property and will be reporting back to the HOA regarding these proposed changes.

The duties of the Architectural Review committee have been assumed by the BOD to streamline this process and to get a better control over situations that have developed where residents have changed the structure of a condo without prior approval or permission. In addition the BOD has completed and come to an agreement with the sponsor regarding the shortfall for 2007 in an attempt to resolve some of the outstanding issues we have with the builder. The sponsor has not at this time given up his position as a BOD member.

There is a contract now in place where a CPA who specializes in Condominiums will review all the records of 2008 and the financial reports will be provided to the residents of Windcrest East. We will also be asking for a review of prior years records.

Due to the harsh winter the BOD will be having the streets and driveways looked at in the next few weeks by contractors. Some driveways have minor cracks that are appearing however they are nothing compared to the cracks that are appearing in the roadways. We will be attempting to find a solution to the problem to protect the community's investment.

The garbage truck company has now changed the time for the pickup hence there have been complaints about homeowners rushing out in their PJ's to get the refuse out on the street in the morning. Please be considerate of your neighbors and put the garbage out the night before but only after dusk as per the house rules. Not all the night attire observed should be seen in the light of day according to the complainants.

Members of the BOD had recently been invited to a seminar on condos. For those who attended it was an experience. The topics ranged from requirements for water hydrants, (the cost ranged from \$150 annually for inspection to \$5,000 for a transfer to a water authority), swimming pools, upkeep and care of the property on an annual basis and why you should not have bird feeders etc. Birds themselves are not the problem; it's the seed that bring mice (we have received complaints about) and also deer (which we have also had complaints about). These animals in turn bring ticks to the property which harbor Lyme and other diseases. People who walk dogs were considered the best source of information about what type of ticks are present. The Community Associations Institute presented a lot of useful information and hopefully they will have more programs like this in the future.



Clubhouse Kitchen

NOTES FROM THE LANDSCAPE COMMITTEE

It is officially spring but don't be too surprised if we still get some cold days. The 'official' last day to expect frost in this area is May 15th. After that you can safely plant your tender new seedlings and annual plants with no fear that they will be damaged by cold weather.

After your daffodils & tulips have finished blooming, cut off the stalk with the dead flower to prevent it from putting its energy into producing seeds. This will give the bulb a chance to grow and regenerate itself for next year's blooms.

Give your acid loving shrubs a bit of fertilizer to start them off. Hollytone or any other fertilizer for acid loving shrubs will do. Use about 1/2 cup -1 cup per shrub, depending on its size. Deer have been feeding on Arborvitae, Azaleas, Euonomous etc during the winter. A feeding of compost and/or fertilizer will help them grow back.

When selecting a plant or shrub, think where you are going to place it and how big it will be at maturity. Tags on the plants will state if they prefer sun or shade, wet or dry sites as well as how big they will be at maturity. This will save you money and grief in the long run. Many cultivars have been bred to be smaller in size to suit our smaller sized gardens. A good nursery will have such selections. Remember that the hole that you place a shrub in should be well prepared, am mended with compost and larger than the pot that the shrub came in. Don't put a \$100 shrub in a 50-cent hole and expect good results.

Information sheets on plant selections suitable for LI, deer resistant shrubs, and specific cultivars to suit your needs are available from the Cooperative Extension. There are info. sheets to cover almost everything in a garden. Nassau County has a web site for printed information and a phone call-in site: 516-228-0426 X7 (M-Th 10 -12:30), or www.cce.cornell.edu/nassau/.
